How does The Spy Who Killed Me work?

The Spy Who Killed Me has been written for 14 to 18 guests – plus the host or co-ordinator. The step-by-step guide explains which characters to omit should you have fewer than 18 guests (you do need at least 14, however). Here's how that works:

The Spy Who Killed Me runs over the course of three or four hours and is particularly suited to a buffet meal. One person is the Head Porter, and acts as organizer and co-ordinator, responsible for making sure everything runs smoothly and that all the guests have the information they need.

Weapons Talks Stall

The world's governments have all expressed regret that the recent attempt to negotiate strategic arms treaties has stalled.
